#### PUT 14 HAMS ON A HILL AND WATCH WHAT HAPPENS!!!

Yes the West Rand branch actually took part in the SARL VHF-UHF contest this time.

The Trek up to Hill-Snacks road house in Krugersdorp started about 4pm on Friday 20 September. Our first priority was to set up the tents, this took longer than expected as we battled for about 45 minutes setting up one of Gavin's (ZR6GJP) complicated tents (so much for being a Scout Master HI HI!). In the mean time Keith (ZR6PRO) arrived with another tent and a generator, and before we knew it, both tents were up and our site started to look as if it might turn into our planned 'antenna farm' yet.

As it was starting to get dark, we decided to get the generator going; whoops generators need petrol, don't they. Chris (ZR6TAA) had to rush of to the nearest petrol station to fetch some for us, while we lit up the gas lamps and waited patiently for his return.

Not much more work was done that evening, we tried to get some sleep in preparation for the hard weekends work ahead of us.

Early Saturday morning we started assembling antennas and putting up masts. We put up a 10-12 metre armstrong rotatable mast for 2m, with 2 2BCX 16 element yagis on it, one mounted vertically and the other horizontally. We also slapped a 70cm slim jim on the top. Mil spec cable was used courtesy of Craig (ZR6REV).

Next we decided to start putting up the 6m antenna, we had a 8m pole planned for this, which turned out to be closer to 10m long. Before pulling up the mast with the clubs 5 element yagi on top, we thought it would be a good idea to set the SWR, or at least check it. Our next problem was then encountered when we took Wally's (ZR6ARX) 6m rig out of the box, plugged it in and found, after about half an hour of trying to convince ourselves otherwise, that it was faulty (no power out) .

In desperation we sent John (ZS6JON) with the rig to Peter (ZS6ZM) to see if he could do something with it. John promptly came back with Peter's own rig, which he kindly offered to let us use. We proceded to check the antenna, found that is was alright and pulled the mast up, without much difficulty.

While all this was happening Keith (ZS6AGF) arrived with our tables from the club, these were promptly set up in the tents and the rigs wired up to power supplies and extra large 12 volt batteries supplied by Tony (ZS6BJQ) and Johan (ZS6JVV).

The 70cm yagi and a co-linear were also added to our already extensive looking collection of antennas. All the rigs were connected up and ready to go after some last minute cable making and repairing.

About 1pm on Saturday John had to rush of again to Peter's place, the VFO had gone faulty on his rig, fortunately it was something small and we had it back in no time at all (about 10 minutes before the contest started). At about 13h30 while John was away with the 6m rig, there was action over the edge of the cliff, one of the hang gliders had crashed into the cliff face, injuring himself very badly. Our 'in house' paramedic Chris (ZR6TAA) was off like a shot down the mountain with his first aid box, an ambulance was arranged via the 625 repeater with the help of Hans (ZS6HJB). There was about 15 minutes to go and half our operators were down the mountain helping Chris with his patient. Fortunately the majority returned before the contest actually started.

At 14H00 sharp the contacts started pouring in on all the bands, in spite of our fantastic collection of antennas we found Wally's slim jim the most usefull for 2m and most of our contacts were made using it.

Later on that afternoon, the weather changed and a bad storm started. I was standing on the edge of the ridge trying to make a 1296 contact with ZS6TJ when the wind came up, Nic's ZR6AEZ 1296 yagi nearly went over the edge with his radio with the first violent gust of wind. Within five or ten minutes the storm was in full swing and mumbles of unplugging anntenas, radios and covering the generator were heard floating around the now crouded operating tent.

Our BRAVE operators refused to leave their microphones and ZS6WR remained on the air throughout the storm. Many contacts were being made at this time, espescially on 6m where quite a lot of good DX was coming through. John ZS6JON handled most of that, with a bit of help from Louisa ZR6LOU when we needed a bit more power from the linear (her higher pitched voice made quite a difference). Halfway through the storm, the SWR on the 6m antenna rose above acceptable operating limits, and because of the good conditions on this band it was decided to repair the antenna immediately. It was promptly lowered and the gamma-match dried off and sealed with a plastic bag. Within twenty minutes it was back in service, and the contacts were rolling in again.

Our site being almost on top of the world, was very susceptible to the violent wind that went with the storm, as Craig ZR6REV found out when he saw the remains of his small two man tent that had been just about completely flattened. With a bit of help Keith ZR6PRO just managed to keep his ten man tent on the ground. It was obviously not designed to withstand winds of such a magnitude, but using a few locally available rocks and people placed in strategic positions inside the tent acting as supports, the tent survived and remained on the ground. Our generator also stopped during the storm, fortunately we had battery power so the operating was not affected that much. The generator was working again within a few minutes after it was discovered that it was low on oil.

At about 22H00 we had a visit from the municipality security department, apparently they had received reports of suspicious activity on the ridge and our floodlights could be seen for quite a long way. The man was quite releived to find out we were only a bunch of crazy Hams and not an A.W.B. political meeting like he was expecting. He stayed with us for a while as we explained the basics of amateur radio to him.

Operating continued till late that night, or should I say early the next morning, the last contact was made sometime between 1 and 2 am on Sunday. Most of us slept in cars that evening, due to the conditions of the tents after the storm.

Operating continued early in the morning about 06H3O, while the rest of us started breakfast and tidied up the place a bit.

Kees ZR6AOR arrived during the course of the morning, with some 10/20 GHz equipment which he used to try and establish contact with ZS6TJ, quite unsuccesfully we might add. While he was in our grid square we grabbed a contact of him on 1296 which increased our points quite considerably, thanks go to ZS6TJ for sending us some points.

The rest of the contest went pretty smoothly, with the last contact coming in at 14H00 exactly, after which we started the big job of dismantling the station.

Our sincere thanks go to all the operators and to the people who helped with transport of equipment as well as the loan of equipment ranging from tents to generators to radios. Special thanks must go to Craig ZR6REV for all his help with equipment and antennas, and to Wally and Peter ZS6ZM for their help with 6m.

We definitely didn't win the contest, but a great time was had by all. Watch out TJ !! we'll be ready for you next year.

Once again the West Rand Branch had a successful week in manning an amateur radio station at the RIE beside Florida Lake. This event is well known throughout the nation as well as many parts of the world. The Eisteddford took place from the 27th September to 6th of October 1991. Briefly the station consisted of the following:

HF SSB/CW Rig (TS830) operating on 80, 40, 20, 15, & 10 meters, 2 Meter FM rig, Satellite Station. Weather satellite monitoring system (Courtesy of Julius Lieberman. PC with satellite tracking program running.

The station was set up on the 26th Sep and testing commenced so that by the 27th all was ready to go.

Following are some statistics which very nicely depicts the success of the station.

Number of VHF QSO's logged --- 120.

Number of HF QSO's logged --- 375.

Number of countries worked --- 58.

Number of competing countries at Eisteddford --- 28.

Number of these countries worked --- 21.

Some, to mention four, of the rare stations worked were ALBANIA, SOUTH SHETLAND ISLANDS, TRANSKEI and DES ROCHES ISLANDS. During the 10 days of operating and manning the station 10 ZR's and 21 ZS's of the branch gave of their time to keep things going. When one considers that each day was divided into three shifts and each day started at 8:00 am and ended at about 11:00pm it was a stout effort indeed by the club members. I thank all the of those who in one way or another contributed to making this what has probably been the most successful, and enjoyable, events that the club has undertaken to support. I include those members who were physically unable to be at the RIE site for also standing by and giving us the support on the air. I do however, thank Om's Cedar ZS6JQ, Clive ZS6CLC and Chris ZR6TAA for their efforts which were really over and above what one expects, but which made this event so much more of a success and easier to manage. 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#### J.O.T.A. ( JAMBOREE ON THE AIR)

In an endevour to promote JOTA amongst amateur radio operators, the following are some comments and explanations on JOTA from a Scouting point of view.

### Jota has two main objectives:

1 To Make the 4th Scout Law Live. (A Scout is a friend to all and a brother to every other Scout)

The average Scout has few opportunities of meeting Scouts from other countries. Although he can't shake hands with them during the Jamboree, he can talk to them.

2 To Open New Fields of Interest.

An introduction to a mateur radio may help a boy discover a latent interest, which may lead him to an eventual career in electronics - radio, television, computers, space travel etc. It may also encourage him to work on Proficiency Badges related to radio, electricity, signalling etc.

#### WHAT IS J.O.T.A.

Jamboree on the air is an annual event which uses a mateur radio to enable Scouts and Guides in many countries to talk to each other. It always takes place during the third full weekend in October and is co-ordinated by the World Scout Bureau in Switzerland.

JOTA is getting young people to talk to each other using ham radio. It is not trapping youngsters into getting bored out of their minds watching and listening whilst you shout what sounds like gibberish to them into a microphone, or worse still demonstrate your skills with a morse key.

#### JOTA PROMOTES PEACE AND FRIENDSHIP.

The 34th Jamboree on the air is scheduled to take place during the weekend of the 19/20th October 1991. This years event is being promoted under the theme of "Peace and Friendship through communication".


I believe that in order for to scouts to appreciate JOTA and really have a fun filled weekend, Scouts should set up a field station. It is great fun building a tower out of gum poles and then securing antennas to the tower. It is not necessary to use beams as JOTA is not a contest to see who can contact the most number of stations, it should be seen as an oppurtunity to give the Scouts the chance to talk to as many other Scouts as possible.

Scouts get bored very quickly if they have to just sit and listen to what is going on they will get bored very quickly. The more they are involved, the more they will enjoy JOTA. If a lot of boys are present it is usually a good idea to divide them into groups. While one group is operating, the other groups can be busy with other activities. Many other avtivities such as basic electricity, electronics etc can be taught to the boys over such a weekend.

With a bit of planning on the part of the Scouters and with the assistance of the ham radio operator JOTA can be one of the most exciting activities in the Scouting life of a boy.



HAMNET: Hamnet need operators at Kyalami on a regular basis call HQ if you are interested. You do get free tickets. There are about 8 races per year. On the Hamnet on the air discussion, Wally brought up the fact that it took

so long to process membership applications.

INTERNATIONAL CALL SIGN BOOK : Contributions are to be collected by John ZS6AOP.

BIRTHDAY BOOK QUESTIONNAIRES: Questionnaires were available at the meeting and in the Anode. It was decided to continue the practice.

FINANCIAL REPORT: Des ZR6DED reported that we had R4 146,40 in the bank. The membership presently stood at 154.

NOVEMBER MEETING RANDFONTEIN: We would meet at the site of the old clubhouse and travel together. Meeting is in CD boardroom. Sarel ZS6APO to arrange antennas.

GENERAL: 1. Sarel ZS6APO said that 6 amateurs were required to assist with communications for the Roof of Africa rally 10 to 12 October. Passports would be required, they would pay for hotel but you would have to pay your own transport.

2.Bulletin. After a long discussion it was decided to try

and shorten the bulletin to be finished by 12h15.

3.CD Day 9 October. We would have to transport the tower from RIE to CD building and erect it on Tuesday night. Ron ZS6BHH was to organise operators. Sarel ZS6APO and Wally AR6ARX were to speak to CD.
